## Leaf and Yard Waste Collection

The Road Crew will be collecting leaves throughout the Township by Zones, beginning on November 13th. For your convenience, roads are listed below by Zone. Zone 1 may take upwards of two weeks, weather permitting. If your road is not listed in any of these zones, collection will commence following collection of Zone 3. The road crew will go through the Township by zone one more time, weather permitting. Streets are listed in the order of how collection is handled.

Leaves should be raked into a pile at the curb, making sure leaves are not piled next to mailboxes or trees. *Please do not bag leaves!* The Township will not pick-up bagged leaves. Keep storm sewer drains clear of leaves. Cars should not be parked over piles of leaves.

**Yard Waste Collection** – The Road Crew will collect yard waste from November 6th through November 10th. Items should be bundled, tied, or placed in brown paper bags, no larger than 2'x2' and weighing no more than 20 pounds. No plastic bags, please!

**Don't want to wait for collection?** The Township provides two forty-yard containers behind the municipal building for leaves and yard waste. Please use brown paper bags. *No plastic bags, please!* 



**PLEASE NOTE:** All park restrooms will be closed on November 6th for the season. Please note: Restrooms will remain open at the Butch Boyer Memorial Pavilion at Amity Community Park.

When the snow begins to fall, be prepared. Help us help YOU!

Our crews work tirelessly to ensure roads are passable as quickly as possible for our residents.

#### Following a few simple rules will make Old Man Winter a little more bearable:

Under International Property Maintenance Code, Section 302.3.1, where sidewalks exist those responsible for sidewalks shall have at least a two-foot wide path cleared of snow and ice within 24-hours after cessation of the snowfall. You must comply immediately to avoid penalties. Penalties can include fines not to exceed \$1,000.00 per day until resolved.

Plow or shovel your snow to the side of your driveway, away from the flow of traffic. Clearing snow for a distance before your driveway allows the plow to "unload" before reaching your driveway.

Additionally, by piling snow away from the direction of oncoming snow plows, the bulk of the snow will not be pushed back onto your driveway making less work for you later! If the snow plow puts snow in your driveway, please know this is not done intentionally.

Do not shovel snow into the street! Shoveling snow into the street at any time can cause safety issues, not to mention it's against the law, per Chapter 7, Section 104.

Keep an eye on the weather! Per Chapter 19, Section 403, whenever there is accumulation of 1" or more of snow and/or ice, you must remove your vehicle from the street. Police will issue violations of \$40.00 per day for vehicles left on the street with 1" or greater accumulation. You may want to have a back-up plan. If you're not home and your vehicle is on the street, having someone able to move it for you during a winter storm is a quick savings of \$40.00!

Lastly, please help firefighters by making sure hydrants are accessible! If you have a fire hydrant near your house, please remove ice and snow, clear a 3-foot by 3-foot perimeter around the hydrant and clear a path from the hydrant to the street.


## One Cool Ride to School

### Lake Drive Park

You may have noticed some activity at the Lake Drive Park. The park is getting a facelift, of sorts. Your Township road crew demolished the old pavilion earlier this year and construction has begun to erect a new, more centrally located pavilion.

The renovations include the addition of handicap accessibility throughout the park. Township personnel was utilized where possible for this project, with the actual contract being awarded to Construction Masters Services at a cost of \$89,944.00. The Lake Drive Park Improvements Project was partially funded by a DCED grant award of \$30,000.00, with the remaining balance being paid for by the Township. Once completed, this pavilion will be available for rentals. Stay tuned for more information in the upcoming spring edition of the newsletter!

### On-Lot Tanks to Pump or Not to Pump

Although some septic haulers recommend pumping your system every two (2) years, Amity Township Ordinance regulations, which were mandated to match PA DEP regulations, require all on-lot septic tanks to be pumped and inspected every three (3) years. In the spring of the year in which you are required to pump, a reminder is mailed to each homeowner by the Township explaining the program. Additionally, an expiration date is listed on the Certificate of Compliance you received during your last cycle. It lists the year you are to have it pumped and inspected. Should you choose to have it pumped on a non-required year, please keep the hauler's inspection report card and pump slip and turn it in when you receive the spring reminder letter. Amity Township accepts pumping report cards within one year from the date you turn it in. You will then be required to meet the Ordinance three (3) years from the time you had it pumped. ### Important Changes to Emergency Alerts!

The Department of Emergency Services is pleased to announce the roll out of a new upgraded BerksAlert mass notification system.

During serious emergencies, public safety officials will release information by using the BERKS ALERT program. The message will then be delivered to the devices that are registered in the system. While the most important messaging, such as that related to disaster response actions, will be sent to any device registered. Individuals participating in the system may also "opt-in" to certain other categories about which they desire notifications. These categories include severe weather watches, amber alerts, road closures, and general community news.

When an individual registers for this service, they will be prompted to enter their home address and the address of other locations of interest (such as a child's daycare center, school, or a place of business). Alerts that are appropriate to these locations of interest will then be sent to the subscriber's registered device(s).

Get local alerts about emergencies, severe weather, and road closures on your cell or email. When situations arise in Berks County that may affect you and your family, Berks Alert lets local officials notify you quickly.

## Superhero 5K & Family Walk

In the Fall of 2013, Aidan Dunion of Douglassville, was a happy, healthy 4-year old starting Preschool and super excited to be playing on his first Amity soccer team. After his parents started to notice balance issues on the soccer field and at home, he was sent for a MRI at CHOP.

Sadly, Aidan was diagnosed with an aggressive, incurable and inoperable brain stem tumor, Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG). Doctors explained that Aidan would die within the next 8-12 weeks with no treatment OR in the next 9-12 months with 30-days of radiation. A child diagnosed with DIPG today faces the same prognosis as a child diagnosed over 50 years ago. There is still no effective treatment and no chance of survival.

After a grueling 10-month battle, unable to move, speak, see, eat, drink, and eventually breathe, 4-year old Aidan passed away August of 2014.

Months later, his family found a way to turn this tragedy into a way of honoring Aidan. They formed Aidan's Avengers<sup>™</sup>, a non-profit, section 501(c)(3)organization. Their mission is: "Understanding the devastating effects of pediatric brain cancer, we strive to raise awareness and funding for research programs that focus on Pediatric Brain Tumors and to provide financial assistance for families affected by Pediatric



Brain Cancer."

September is Childhood Cancer Awareness month and the Gold Ribbon is the international awareness symbol for pediatric cancer. Unlike other cancer awareness ribbons, which focus on a singular type of cancer, the gold ribbon is a symbol for ALL forms of cancer affecting children and adolescents.

The 5K/Walk route will be lined with GOLD RIBBONS in memory of ALL the children who have lost their battle or continue to fight Childhood Cancer. We hope the community will come out on Saturday, September 30 in support of our runners and walkers, dressed in their Superhero attire, for such an important cause.

## Update: Spotted Lanternfly


Amity Township has been in the quarantine for the Spotted Lanternfly (SLF) since November 2015. We knew they were here, and now more than ever we are seeing a huge uptick in sightings. SLF are currently in their adult stage and resemble a beautiful butterfly. Unfortunately, as the SLF feeds on trees this pretty pest continues to be a very bad bug. In adult form, the SLF feeds on trees such as the Tree of Heaven (Ailanthus) and then tends to seek out sweeter meals such as fruit trees and grape vines. Beginning in October, the SLF will lay eggs until the first few hard frosts. Eggs can be found on trees, rocks, and manmade objects stored outside. Egg masses contain an average of 30-50 individual eggs and are covered with wax to protect them. What can you do to help prevent the spread of this beautiful bad bug? Familiarize yourself with facts by visiting the PA Department of Agriculture's website to see the lifecycle, who's in the quarantine and other helpful information http://www.agriculture. pa.gov/protect/plantindustry/spotted\_lanternfly/Pages/default.aspx.

#### These simple control measures will ensure you do your part to contain the SLF:

- KILL any bugs you may see.
- SCRAPE any eggs found on trees and other stationary items.
- LOOK before you leave. Inspect your vehicle before traveling to areas currently not in the quarantine.

The USDA has provided \$1M in funding to the PA Department of Agriculture (PADA) to combat the spread of the SLF. As part of this funding, you will see an increased presence in the area of vehicles and personnel, mainly along major arteries such as Route 422 and Route 562. Vehicles will be marked and employees will have photo identification. Employees will be doing visual inspections to detect areas where there is a high presence of the Tree of Heaven and may be knocking on doors of residents and businesses to request permission to enter properties. Part of the funding will allow the PADA to identify these heavily populated Tree of Heaven areas and potentially address removal and treatment.

Remember, every resident who effectively uses control measures will help reduce the potential for this insect to spread to new territory!

## What's Happening at Monocacy Hill?

Monocacy Hill Conservation Assn (MHCA) was recently awarded a \$5,000 grant from the Schuylkill Highlands to work on Invasive trees at Monocacy Hill Recreation Area. They will partner with Amity Township and the PA Dept of Agriculture to treat Ailanthus trees and Norway Maples, both non-native tree species. The \$5,000 will be matched by funds from MHCA and Amity Township as well as volunteer hours by members of MHCA.

Spanning two years, this project will coordinate with another program currently being completed at Monocacy Hill, the banding of Ailanthus trees to survey for Spotted Lanternfly, a non-native insect from Asia. Banding in 2017 marks the second year that the volunteer banding was being done. There has been a sharp increase in the number of insects captured by the sticky bands. This year with only six trees banded there were well over 1,000 Spotted Lanternflies captured, as compared with only 1 captured at this time last year.

Some Ailanthus trees will be removed and others will be treated with an insecticide to kill the Spotted Lanternflies as they feed on the trees. Spotted Lanternflies were discovered in Berks County in 2014 and have spread to over 84 municipalities in southeastern PA. These insects are a threat to vineyards, fruit trees and hardwood species in the state.


