Amity is looking for one individual to join our seven (7) member Park & Recreation Board. The Board meets at the Township building on the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7PM. The Board is advisory to the Board of Supervisors and reviews and considers all things recreation and open space related. Interested parties shall submit a letter of interest and resume to manager@amitytownshippa.com by December 15th.



The Board of Supervisors has approved advertising of the 2024 draft budget. The main increase in the 2024 budget consists of personnel related expenses, emergency medical services, recycling services, storm water costs, debt service, and CPI adjustments for nearly all expenses. The draft budget requires a small increase of .225 mil equating to \$22.50 per \$100K of assessed value.

Sewer rates will increase from \$140.00/quarter to \$145.00/quarter. The major upgrade/expansion is expected to be put out for bid in the beginning of 2024. Grant applications have been submitted to offset some of the expected costs. Rates will be re-evaluated after determination of funding methods to be used for this project.

The proposed budget is available for public inspection for a minimum of 20 days and will be considered for adoption at the Board meeting scheduled for December 20th.

Sewer Rate Increase

Quarterly sewer rental rates will increase by \$5.00, to \$145.00 with the January 1st bills.

In an effort to address some of the comments received regarding our rates we have provided a neighboring municipality average water and sewer bill for comparison. We are striving to keep our rates reasonable, but sometimes a rate increase is inevitable to fund necessary improvements to stay in compliance with PA DEP regulations.

Residents are charged a flat rate on a quarterly basis. A flat rate means you are not billed based on metered usage.

Slow Down, Stay Alert for Deer



As the fall breeding season for deer is in full swing, it is more important than ever to slow down and remain alert for activity. This is particularly important in the Commonwealth as Pennsylvania drivers unfortunately face one of the highest rates nationwide of a vehicular accident involving a big game animal, like deer: a 1-in-59 chance.


Drivers can reduce their chance of collisions with deer – and the associated injuries and property damage – by staying alert and better understanding deer behavior. Deer often travel in groups and walk in single file. If one deer crossed the road in front of a driver, another could be right behind it.

A driver who hits a deer with a vehicle is only required to report the accident to the Game Commission within 24 hours if the deer dies and the Pennsylvania resident wishes to keep the carcass. To do so, they can call 1-833-742-4868 or 1-833-742-9453. An agency dispatcher will collect the information needed to provide a free permit number. To report a dead deer for removal from state roads, motorists can call the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation at 1-800-349-7623.

2024 Finnegan Foundation Internships

IF YOUR PIPES FREEZE

Shut off the water immediately: Don't attempt to thaw pipes without turning off the main shut-off valve

Thaw a frozen pipe by warming the air around it: Do not leave space heaters unattended and avoid using kerosene heaters or open flames.

Carefully turn the water back on: Once pipes are thawed, slowly turn the water back on and check pipes and joints for any cracks or leaks.


BEFORE THE COLD SETS IN

Know how to shut off your water: Locate your main water shut-off valve. In many homes, it is located near the water meter or close to where the water pipe enters the home.

Check sprinkler or irrigation systems: Make sure everything is turned off and fully drained.

Eliminate sources of cold air near water lines: Check for pipes in areas that might be prone to freezing, such as crawl spaces, unheated rooms, basements, garages, and exterior walls. Fix drafty windows, insulate walls around pipes and plug drafts around doors.

Protect your pipes: Where pipes are exposed to cold, wrap them with insulation or heat tape (even fabric or newspaper can help).



Crews do their best to remove snow quickly and efficiently. When there is 1" or more of snow and/or ice accumulation, vehicles must be removed from the street. Vehicles not in compliance will be fined \$40.00 per day.

International Property Maintenance Code, Section 302.3.1 state, where sidewalks exist, property owners are responsible to have a 2-foot wide path cleared of snow and ice within 24-hours after cessation of snowfall.

Please help our volunteer fire companies by clearing a 3-foot by 3-foot perimeter around fire hydrants located on your property.



Residents struggling with their home heating bills may apply for assistance from the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

LIHEAP is a federally funded program that helps individuals and families pay their heating bills through home heating energy assistance grants. It also provides crisis grants to help in the event of an emergency or if a resident is in danger of losing his or her heat due to broken equipment, lack of fuel or termination of utility service.

The income eligibility guidelines for LIHEAP are \$21,870 for an individual, \$29,580 for a couple and \$45,000 for a family of four. Residents may apply for LIHEAP online, by phone 610-736-4228 or by contacting their local county assistance office 610-736-4211.

The program runs through April 5, 2024.

The Pennsylvania Treasury Department is currently holding more than \$4.5 billion in unclaimed property, with about one in 10 residents eligible to recoup that property.

Unclaimed property includes dormant bank accounts, uncashed checks, insurance policies and contents of forgotten safe deposit boxes. The amounts can range from a few dollars to a few thousand dollars, with the average value of a claim being about \$1,600.
