


January 2024 - Digital Newsletter

After the holidays, our Public Works crews will work through the Township to collect and chip trees on Thursdays: January 4th, 18th and 25th and on Tuesdays, January 9th, 16th and 23rd. Crews will work through the Township using the same schedule as leaf collection.

If your address is not listed in any of the zones, then your collection will start after zone 3 is completed.

Place your tree away from trash bins to avoid haulers disposing of your tree. Remove all decorations and lights from your trees before putting them out for pick-up.

Recycling Reminders



- -Put recycling out the night before your scheduled pick-up (i.e., Monday night for Tuesday pick-up.
- -If your pickup falls on a holiday week, then the pick-up is pushed out one day. We have flyers that show the schedule available in our lobby.
- -Break down your boxes so more materials can fit in the truck.
- -Call immediately to report missed pick-ups at 610-953-0016. We can sometimes get it picked up that day if reported early enough.
- -Trash cans marked with other providers' logos will not be picked up if put out for recycling. (example J.P. Mascaro will not pick up a Whitetail Disposal can, full of recyclables).
- -Old or damaged bins can be marked for recycling and left out on your pick-up day. You can also place them in the grassy area next to the front door of the Township building and our staff will dispose of them.

If you need a recycling bin or to replace one, we have two kinds available at our office for pickup Mon-Fri 8:00am-4:30pm. We have a round bin with a lid or a rolling bin with a lid. Unfortunately, we do not deliver bins.

2024 Tax Increases

TOWNSHIP:

The Board of Supervisors adopted the 2024 budget as presented with a small increase of .225 mil equating to \$22.50 per \$100K of assessed value. The largest part of this increase will support EMS services.

COUNTY:

Berks County adopted their 2024 budget with an 8.99% tax increase. It is their first increase in 6 years. Taxes will increase from 7.657 mils to 8.345 mils equating to \$834.50 per \$100K of assessed value.

Snow Removal 101




International Property Maintenance Code, Section 302.3.1 state, where sidewalks exist, property owners are responsible to have a 2-foot-wide path cleared of snow and ice within 24-hours after cessation of snowfall.

If there is 1" or more of snow and/or ice accumulation, vehicles must be removed from the street. Vehicles not in compliance will be fined \$40.00 per day.

Please help our volunteer fire companies by clearing a 3-foot by 3-foot perimeter around fire hydrants located on your property.





Approaches and exits to rural or curbside mailboxes should be clear of snow, ice, vehicles, trash-cans, objects or obstacles. Snow should be cleared at least ten feet on each side of your mailbox and all the way up to the mailbox post to allow for safe delivery of your mail. Some postal customers opt to put a temporary mailbox in the snow in situations where snow removal is not practical; the same guidelines apply for clearance as permanent mailboxes. The carrier needs to be able to deliver to the mailbox without backing up. Your consideration and cooperation is appreciated!






MERGENCYVEHICLE KIT

Long-distance trips are especially risky in a snowstorm; question whether the trip is really crucial. The lumpike will sometimes restrict travel to emergency vehicles — if necessary.




You need to see well to drive safely.


STATE LAW states if your wipers are on, your headlights should be too. It lets you see and be seen during a snowstorm. Remember, low beams often make it easier to see in heavy or blowing snow.




Conditions often vary widely during a snowstorm; dry parement can quickly change to slick or ky pavement because of drifting snow, temperature drops and plow cycles. The opening hours and closing volley of a storm tend to bring the most severe fluctuations. Use extra caution on beldges and ramps where ice can often form without warning.




If you choose to travel, know it could take significantly longer to get there. Plan ahead, and build in extra travel time. Be prepared with an emergency vehicle kit just in




Drive at a speed suitable for conditions and avoid sudden starts and stops. During a storm, the posted speed limit is usually too fast. It's the driver's responsibility to slow down to a safe speed. It's also your responsibility not to bit the vehicle in front of you, so allow plenty of stopping distance between vehicles.




If conditions warrant, the speed limit on the PA Turnpike will be lowered to 45 mph during a storm. In addition, the Turnpike will impose bans on empty and double trailers and other types of commercial and passenger vehicles.



All windows and mirrors should be completely clear to improve visibility; but don't forget to clear the hood, roof and trunk. State law states that if snow or ice from your vehicle strikes a vehicle or person and causes death or injury, you can be prosecuted.




The equipment operator cannot see you; and your visibility is limited because of snow spray from the plow. Besides, the roadway is untreated and slick in front of the truck, so what's the point? It never pays to pass a plow.



Our equipment operators cannot adequately clear the road with disabled vehicles blocking the way, so all abandoned vehicles are immediately towed during a weather emergency. If you do breakdown during a snowstorm, be sure your vehicle is as far from active travel lanes as possible.





Focusing on driving and buckling up are two of the best ways to ensure everyone's safety. When the weather is bad, they're doubly critical. Put the smartphone down and the seatbell on.

Selling a house or buying a house in Amity?



Current Homeowners (Sellers):

- 1. Ensure you have an I&I re-sale inspection completed prior to the sale of your home if you have **public sewer**. A plumber who can televise and record is needed for this inspection. The Township cannot give recommendations on who to use. More information is available on our website.
- 2. If you have **private sewer** (septic system/on-lot system), then you are exempt from the I&I inspection, but you should make sure your septic system has been pumped and your pumping information is up to date with the Township.
- 3. Turn off auto-pay if you have it enabled through Xpress Bill Pay.
- 4. Please leave your recycling bins for the next owners if you are moving out of the Township.

New Homeowners (Buyers):

- 1. Stop into the Amity Township building or visit our website www.amitytownshippa.com to pick-up a recycling schedule and/or bin.
- 2. Trash is private and a provider must be selected by the homeowner.
- 3. Sign up for Xpress Bill Pay for your sewer bill if applicable. Auto pay and paperless billing are available.

Safety Tips



Danger, Danger! Prevent Carbon Monoxide Poisoning

- Install CO detectors on each floor, especially in hallways of your living space or bedrooms. Detectors should be mounted 6 inches away from the ceiling or end of the wall, but not over furnace vents or gas stoves or dryers.
- · Have your heating system, water heater and any other gas, oil or coal burning appliances serviced every year.
- · Never use gas-powered tools, generators, grills or camp stoves indoors.
- · Never use a gas range or oven for heating.
- · Never leave a running vehicle in a garage with the door closed.

Causes of POISONING

- 1. Blocked or clogged chimney
- 2. Gas or wood-burning fireplaces
- 3. Portable kerosene heaters
- 4. Gas stove
- 5. Gas dryer
- 6. Leaking chimney pipe or flue, or malfunctioning furnace
- 7. Corroded gas water heater vent pipe
- 8. Grilling in a poorly ventilated space
- 9. Running car in a closed garage
- 10. Operating gas-powered tool indoors

Recognize the Symptoms

- Flu-like symptoms

Medium Exposure:

- · Severe headache
- Drowsiness
- Confusion
- · Rapid heart rate

Severe Exposure:

- Unconsciousness
- Convulsions
- respiratory failure





JANUARY IS NATIONAL RADON ACTION MONTH

Radon is a byproduct of uranium decay, which is found in nearly all types of soil. This gas then moves up through the ground and finds its way into structures via cracks and other holes in the foundation. Radon is then trapped inside the structure, where it gradually builds up over time, increasing radon levels and causing unsafe levels of radon exposure. Is it okay to live in a house with radon? Yes, you can stay in a house with radon; however, the E.P.A recommends an approved radon reduction system to be put in place. Does opening windows reduce radon? Increasing air circulation by opening windows and doors will ultimately reduce radon levels inside a structure. Radon is then diluted with the cleaner outdoor air.

The Township has 3 radon detecting kits at our office for residents of Amity Township. You must provide a Driver's License and a check (deposit) of \$200.00 that will be returned to you once the kit is returned to the office. We are open Mon-Fri 8am-4:30pm.



The Senior Food Box Program supplements low-income seniors' diets with nutritious food, including non-fat dry and shelf-stable fluid milk, juice, oats, ready-to-eat cereal, rice, pasta, dry beans, peanut butter, canned meat, poultry, fish and canned fruits and vegetables.

To participate, individuals must be at least 60 years old and meet income eligibility guidelines. A single senior's annual income may not exceed \$18,954, and the income for a couple is capped at \$25,636.

Seniors who would like to participate should call 800-468-2433 to be directed to the regional food bank distributing the Senior Food Box in their county of residence.

Residents struggling with their home heating bills may apply for assistance from the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).


LIHEAP is a federally funded program that helps individuals and families pay their heating bills through home heating energy assistance grants. It also provides crisis grants to help in the event of an emergency or if a resident is in danger of losing his or her heat due to broken equipment, lack of fuel or termination of utility service.

The income eligibility guidelines for LIHEAP are \$21,870 for an individual, \$29,580 for a couple and \$45,000 for a family of four. Residents may apply for LIHEAP online, by phone 610-736-4228 or by contacting their local county assistance office 610-736-4211.

The program runs through April 5, 2024.

Storm Water Management



The Difference Between a Detention and a Retention Basin

A detention basin/pond temporarily stores storm water runoff. The basin is designed to manage storm water runoff by storing it and releasing it gradually until completely drained.

Unlike a detention basin, a retention basin or pond is designed to permanently hold water. Retention basins are commonly used when the groundwater is near the surface of the ground. A retention basin will not have an outlet structure. The water collected by a retention basin will either infiltrate into the ground or evaporate.

The advantage of a retention basin over a detention basin is the higher removal of pollutants. Retention basins can also serve as an aesthetic or recreational amenity, as well as a habitat for some wildlife. They will become their own ecosystem.

Who is Responsible for Detention/Retention Basin Maintenance?

While we are all responsible for protecting the quality of our water, you, as the property owner, homeowners' association or business are most likely responsible for maintaining storm water management facilities on your property.
